## 21ST CENTURY TRASH

As with everything else, it seems that even our trash has become more complicated. How we dispose of what we discard has become increasingly important. Electronic waste is the leading contributor of lead in landfills and contains many other harmful metals.

Analog television will be phased out on February 17, 2009, and digital will be phased in. If you don't plan to use a converter box on your old TV, you'll have to dispose of it somehow...but how?

CR&R offers residents two annual (2) bulky item pickups with a four (4) item limit free of charge. **To schedule a bulky item pick-up at**  your curbside, call 24 hours in advance of your regular service day. Bulky Items include: Household appliances, furniture, TVs, carpet rolls & mattresses. CR&R Customer Service number: 800.826.9677.

Retail Chains like Office Max, Staples, and Best Buy have in store recycling bins for batteries and toner cartridges. For \$10-\$15 they will reclaim computer monitors and printers that are boxed and brought into the store.

What about old cameras, MP3 Players, IPods and mobile phones? Radio Shack has an online trade-in program that offers store credit in return for old unwanted items. Check their website for details. Certain restrictions do apply in regard to age and brand.

Remember that it is illegal to dispose of Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) through the residential program. HHW such as used motor oil, solvents, batteries, cleaning products, fluorescent light tubes, old paint, wood preservatives, pesticides, pool chemicals, printer cartridges and unused road flares, must be disposed of at a certified collection center.

# Urban & Suburban Coyotes ...

Coyotes (canis latrans) can be found throughout most of California. They are very adaptable and besides inhabiting rural areas of the state, have permanently blended themselves into our suburban landscape. Emboldened by hunger, and decreasing habitat, coyotes have been sighted trotting down suburban sidewalks in broad daylight. Young coyotes tend to be more active during the day than adults.

January, February and March is the usual breeding season in California for this clever carnivore. Coyotes produce one litter per year, with litter sizes averaging 5-6 pups. May through September is the time coyotes care for their young and can be particularly aggressive towards any perceived threats.

A coyote's typical diet consists of rodents, reptiles, amphibians, fruit, baby deer, birds and their eggs, insects and carrion. Covotes living in rural areas prey heavily on sheep, cattle and poultry. In urban and suburban areas coyotes have expanded their diet to include domestic dogs and cats, garbage, and pet food. Small pets are easy prey for a coyote and should be kept indoors at night and during the hours of dawn and dusk. Feed your pets indoors, if possible, or promptly remove their food bowls after meals. Empty and remove water bowls after dark. Secure



outdoor garbage at all times or keep it indoors. Cover and fence in ripe fruit trees and pick up fallen fruit daily.


Although attacks on humans are rare, take care not to leave small children unattended. Coyotes are cunning opportunists, and we must be vigilant in minimizing their opportunities.

Coyotes are not threatened or endangered in California. They are classified as nongame mammals by the Department of Fish and Game and as such can be taken any time using their approved methods. For more info. Visit their website below:

- Be sure you and your family have a well known fire escape plan. Practice home fire drills regularly. Purchase
  fire ladders for upstairs bedrooms. Visit www.ocfa.org
- Check smoke alarm batteries regularly; a system with central backup battery power is best
- Keep several fire extinguishers in your home. Have them recharged periodically per the manufacturer's instructions
- Keep the perimeter of your home clear of dry brush
- Don't overload electrical sockets
- Invest in appliances with auto-shut off features, i.e. coffee makers, irons.
- Set timers when cooking. Immediately turn off the oven before removing food so you won't forget.
- Place space heaters (another major cause of fires) at least 3 ft. away from walls and flammable items. Never leave them running when you're not home.
- Never smoke in bed. Make sure all cigarette butts are fully extinguished.
- Educate your children about the dangers of fire
- Do not allow children to play with matches or lighters. Thousands of fires are set each year for this reason. Keep flammable items out of the reach of children



Caller ID Spoofing

Credit card thieves and telemarketers have added a new weapon to their arsenal of annoyance. Spoofing services are readily available over the internet and are surprisingly cheap. Users provide the Spoofing Service with a number they want to call along with a fake number (and sometimes name) they wish to have appear on the target's Caller I.D. The Spoofing Service then inserts the fake number into their Caller I.D. Spoofing has become the prank of choice for mischievous teens and techno geeks. This is alarming for many reasons: First of all, those paying for Caller I.D. Service are no longer getting what they paid for. Many people have been tricked into giving out their credit card numbers and other sensitive information. Hacking into a rival's voicemail can cause everything from extreme embarrassment to damaged relationships.

Even more disturbing is that some people have used Spoofing to call in fake 911 Emergencies in order to send police and/or S.W.A.T. Teams to their target's home! Before you begin plotting revenge on a rival however, know this: **the Feds have already passed a bill through the House, called "The Truth in Caller I.D. Act" of 2007.** If this bill makes it through the Senate and becomes law, Spoofing will be against the law.

- Did you know that trees are the longest living organisms on Earth?
- There are approximately 25-30 million real Christmas trees sold in the U.S. each year.
- The tree with the deepest roots is a Wild Fig tree, near Echo Caves in South Africa. It has roots reaching 400 feet deep.
- The oldest tree is a Redwood located in Prairie State Park in California. The tree is known as "Eternal God". It is thought to be 12,000 years old. Some argue that it is only 7,000 years old—which still makes it the oldest.
- The tallest living tree can be found in Montgomery State Reserve in California. This Coast Redwood tree is over 1,000 years old, towers at more that 367 feet and is still growing!
- The slowest growing tree is a White Cedar, which has only grown to less than 4 inches tall during its 155 years on earth.
