## Everywhere and everyday there is talk about being "green".

Business is talking about it. Government is talking about it. Conservation groups are talking about it. The question is: What is everyone doing about it?

The District is currently conducting an energy audit with Southern California Edison to determine how best to cut the use of electricity, while saving money at the same time. Some solutions are easy and inexpensive; others are not. On the simple side are installing energy efficient light fixtures, programmable thermostats, and new window shading treatments. More challenging ideas like solar energy-powered buildings and facilities come with a higher price tag.

The audit will provide the District with the facts and figures to decide which options are feasible. Systems such as solar energy panels on buildings require a good deal of investigation. On the plus side, the State of California provides rebates for solar energy. These rebates offset a portion of the capital costs. Another thing to consider is whether a roof has sufficient life to make such an installation feasible. If not, the cost of a new roof must be fac-



# From Henry's Desk



In spite of the economy's downturn, the District's investment portfolio continues to accrue a high rate of return, coupled with safety and liquidity. Reserves are a primary source of funds for funding capital projects such as those described above. These funds are also a hedge against unforeseen future costs or budget cuts.

The District 's budget contains a number of capital projects for the coming year. The replacement of the deteriorated wooden patio cover at the Rossmoor Park Community Center has been removed and the RCSD Board of Directors has approved its replacement with a metal canopy, which is both attractive and functional. Improvements to the Rush Park Auditorium are also budgeted and include replacement of the central air conditioner, lighting, sound system, and replacement of 200 chairs. Also planned are upgrades to the existing irrigation systems at both Rossmoor and Rush Parks, with the addition of smart controller water saving devices.

### THE ROOT OF THE PROBLEM

(Who's Tree Is It Anyway?)



One of the more interesting topics RCSD staff deals with on a daily basis; is parkway trees. Resident

viewpoints regarding Rossmoor's parkway trees vary from the tree lover, who is passionate about protecting our urban forest, to those who see trees as a nuisance, vowing to kill any tree planted in their parkway. The latter group is in the minority since 95% of suitable planting sites have a parkway tree. However, the question remains, whose tree is it?

First the parkway is that area between the curb and the side-walk. Technically, it is the property of the homeowner. The County, however, has an easement that is tantamount to a property right to the parkway. Therefore, any trees which are

planted in the parkway are the property of the County. Rossmoor is somewhat unique in that, by a vote of the people, the Rossmoor Community Services District has been given the right and responsibility for the management and the care and planting of parkway trees. District Policy No. 3080 sets forth the manner and methods for planting, caring, and removal of parkway trees.

Controversy most often occurs when a resident refuses to accept a tree planting or wants a healthy tree removed. In the latter case, the policy is quite explicit on valid reasons under which a tree may be removed. Not wanting an existing tree isn't considered a valid reason; this also applies to not wanting a new tree planted. Because parkway trees are considered a community asset, not an individual homeowner's asset, the District uses reasonable means to

meet both collective and individual needs. Failing to come to agreement on the appropriate course of action can and has led to enforcement of the policy, but only in extreme and rare instances.

For a copy of the District's policy, contact the RCSD office and one will be sent to you. The services of the District's tree consultant are available for evaluating a particular tree issue. Please keep in mind that more often than not, what makes Rossmoor unique from neighboring communities is the trees; not to mention the cleaner and cooler air we breathe because of them.

# The Other "ROOT" of the Problem...

A more specific issue with parkway trees, and in one case, median trees, is residential sewer backups and other damage from tree roots. In the latter case, a homeowner has a right to remove tree roots which are causing, or may cause, damage to property up to the sidewalk. This is purely a homeowner responsibility and neither the County nor the District can assist with these removals.

Sewer backups due to tree roots, are a more complicated matter. First, the **sewer lateral** is the connection between the home and the main sewer line, usually located underneath the street. Removing tree roots from sewer laterals is another homeowner responsibility. Failure to properly maintain these laterals can cause serious damage to private property.



The Rossmoor/Los Alamitos Sewer District maintains the **main sewer lines** in Rossmoor. They have had great success with the use of, and also recommend ROOTX, a nontoxic chemical which dissolves tree roots in sewer pipes. An annual application of the product by a licensed plumbing contractor during sewer cleanout, will more than likely eliminate backups due to tree roots. Another option is for the homeowner to apply the product themselves after carefully reading the instructions.

### WEST NILE VIRUS PREVENTION

 Eliminate any sources of standing water you find at home, the work place and anywhere else you spend time



- Buckets, flower pot saucers and tarps
- Anything that can hold water for a week can produce mosquitoes
- Yard drains frequently have sumps that hold more than enough water
- Report any source of standing water that cannot be eliminated to OCVCD
  - Abandoned homes with out of service pools present real problems
  - Storm water facilities can produce many mosquitoes
- Make sure door and window screens are properly installed and in good condition
  - Two 20th century inventions have reduced the incidence of mosquito-borne disease: Television keeps people indoors at night & screens keep mosquitoes out
- Wear a suitable repellent when outdoors at times when mosquitoes are active.
  - They are most active at dawn and dusk
  - DEET, Picaridin and IR3535 are recommended active ingredients

### **Cranberry Braids**

2 cups cranberries, chopped 1 whole orange, finely chopped 1 1/3 cups firmly packed brown sugar 1 1/2 cups milk 2 (1/4-ounce) packages active dry yeast or 5 teaspoons active dry yeast 1 3/4 cups all-purpose or bread flour, divided use1 1/2 cups butter or margarine 3 large eggs 3/4 teaspoon salt Approximately 7 cups all-purpose or bread flour

- Combine chopped cranberries, chopped orange, and brown sugar in a saucepan. Simmer for 10 to 15 minutes, or until thickened, stirring constantly. Cool.
- Scald milk then cool to 105 to 115\*F. Add yeast and let stand for 5 minutes. Add 1 cup flour; mix well, then set aside for 1 hour.
- 3. Cream butter and 3/4 cup flour with an electric mixer until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in the yeast mixture. Add salt and up to 7 cups flour to make a stiff dough. Knead on a floured surface for 8 to 10 minutes, or until smooth and elastic. Place in a greased bowl, turning to grease the surface. Let rise, covered, in a warm place for 1 hour, or until doubled in bulk.
- 4. Divide dough into three portions and roll each into a 12-inch square. Cut each square into three strips. <u>Spoon</u> the cranberry filling onto each strip and fold to enclose the filling; sealing the edges. Braid the three strips together; seal the ends and tuck under. Repeat with the remaining dough. Let rise, covered, for 45 minutes
- 5. Bake for 30 to 45 minutes in a preheated 350\*F oven, or until golden brown. Cool on a wire rack.

Makes 3 braided loaves.
