What is Urban Runoff? It's a term describing many ways in which the habits of Urbanites pollute the drinking, bathing and fishing water we depend on to sustain life. Pollutants in the aquatic environment disrupt the food chain. Some of these toxins have subtle but devastating effects on the life cycles of certain organisms which are part of the food supply for fish and birds. Without realizing it, you may even be contributing to this pollution. Most of us drive automobiles, which distribute toxic organic and heavy metal exhaust particles onto the streets and highways. Some other examples include: Vehicle maintainence, which can result in the spillage of oil, coolant and other fluids; Cleaning tools or equipment outdoors with chemicals cleaners and detergents; Indiscriminate use of pesticides and fertilizers during landscaping and grounds maintenance; Untidy and leaking *dumpster areas*; Disturbing soil and vegetation during construction, which creates erosion and produces sediment,-a pollutant. All of this harmful matter gets soaked into asphalt and/or washed away and transported into the nearest storm drain by rainwater and water used to wash vehicles outdoors. Some careless people looking for a shortcut, actually dump paint and other chemicals *directly* into storm drains.

In Orange County, with very few exceptions, it is prohibited by Federal, State, and local laws to discharge anything other than clean stormwater runoff to the storm drain system. Please visit www.ocwatershed.com for a list of discharges that are not prohibited under certain circumstances. Regulations adopted by the State Water Resources Control Board as part of the County's new National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit, call for maximizing unpaved areas that can absorb rainfall and pollutants to improve water quality, and enhance the health of creeks and other water bodies downstream of developed areas. Rossmoor is indeed fortunate to have so many trees and predominately unpaved parkways. From <u>Henry's</u> Desk



While Rossmoor remains a tranquil community, there are many issues that have and will be confronting us. The transition to automated refuse collection is over, but many issues remain, particularly the scheduling conflict between Monday street sweeping and refuse collection. The District is working with CR&R and the County to help resolve these matters as they relate to the District's limited involvement in street sweeping, since the District doesn't have authority over refuse collection—Coyotes continue to be a major issue for the community. Members of the public have raised this issue during public meetings of the District and in that limited role as a public forum, the District has been involved in the discussion of this problem with the County, adjoining communities and our two military installations, as those groups and entities work to find solutions.—Public Safety has also risen to the top of the discussion agenda for Rossmoor. While major crime hasn't been an issue, the recent decision to annex Sunset Beach into Huntington Beach presents a question of backup when the Rossmoor patrol vehicle is out of the area or engaged with another call. When Sunset Beach is no longer patrolled by the County Sheriff, the closest backup car will be in Midway City or West Anaheim, (a much further distance). The District is exploring this matter with the Sheriffs Department in the District's limited role, since once again, the District does not have authority over public safety.—Last, but certainly not least, there could be boundary and service issues in the future in relation to the City of Los Alamitos. That City is in the process of amending their General Plan which may include zoning and other land use criteria for Rossmoor. This is because Rossmoor is in the Sphere of Influence of Los Alamitos. The District will be closely monitoring the process due to the potential for annexation and related boundary and service issues. Stay tuned...

PUBLIC SAFETY

Rossmoor residents piled into the Rush Park Auditorium on July 13th to voice their concerns and brainstorm possible solutions at the Public Safety Workshop. The community spoke out on a range of matters. Residential burglaries and vehicle thefts seemed to be of particular importance to them. The Board suggested that an Ad Hoc Committee be formed with the Orange County Sheriff's Department in order to improve communication and awareness between law enforcement and the District.

Beverly Houghton announced that the RHA Emergency Preparedness Meetings were held every 3rd Thursday of the month at 7 p.m. in the East Room at Rush Park. She stated that currently her attendance is low and she'd really like to see more residents get involved. Beverly volunteers her time to organize this extremely important effort. Your participation would be greatly appreciated!

Traffic safety was also high on the list of resident woes. Typically the California Highway Patrol is the primary contact for traffic related matters such as speeding, however, the O.C. Sheriff's Department can also respond when available.

Did you know that it's NOT O.K. to dispose of light bulbs in the trash? Fluorescent light bulbs contain small amounts of mercury sealed within the glass tubing and include linear, U-tube and circline fluorescent tubes, bug zappers, tanning bulbs, black lights, germicidal bulbs, high output bulbs, and cold-cathode fluorescent bulbs;

High intensity discharge bulbs, which include metal halide, • ceramic metal halide, high pressure sodium, and mercury vapor;

the District. Recent changes and discussions with the County have resulted in a new or revised understanding between the County and the District as to the division of responsibilities.

For example, the County has affirmed that it will be responsible for safety trimming. Second, the County has informed the District that it will exercise its authority to enforce violations of illegal tree removal or damage to street trees and will exercise its authority to assist the District in enforcing the District's policy against paving/covering of parkways. All of these changes leave open some issues as to where the District's authority to enforce tree policies ends and the County's authority begins.—As a result, the District created an Ad Hoc Committee of the Board to address these matters. Meetings are underway with O. C. Public Works and our County Supervisor's office to discuss issues and hopefully develop a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) which describes our respective authorities and responsibilities. Without such an agreement, there will continue to be questions regarding the relationship between the County and the District and how such authorities should be interpreted in the future. Meanwhile, grid trimming and tree planting work continues. We are optimistic that our community will soon be displaying signs designating Rossmoor as a Tree City USA. Trees matter and will continue to be a high priority for the District.
